PRIMARY CARE FOCUS

Primary Care Cancer Focus – Dr Jim McMorran

Anastrozole for breast cancer prevention:

- IBIS-II an international, randomised, double-blind, placebo-controlled trial. Postmenopausal women at increased risk of developing breast cancer were recruited and were randomly assigned (1:1) to either anastrozole (1 mg per day, oral) or matching placebo daily for 5 year (1)
- Cuzick et al reported results of the randomised IBIS-II trial on the extended duration of benefit of anastrozole in preventing breast cancer up to 12 years after entry and indicate for the first time a long-term benefit, which is larger than that seen for tamoxifen in this period
 - anastrozole is an aromatase inhibitor inhibition of aromatase prevents the synthesis of oestrogens
 - no excess of fractures, other cancers, cardiovascular disease, or death from any specific cause was seen in the extended follow-up
 - $\circ~$ number needed to treat to prevent one breast cancer is 29 $\,$
 - large 61% reduction in breast cancer incidence in the first 5 years has been maintained in subsequent follow-up to 12 years
 - the significant 36% reduction during post-treatment follow-up was not significantly smaller than during treatment, and still greater than that observed for tamoxifen, which has produced a roughly constant 29% reduction for 20 years
 - number needed to treat to prevent one breast cancer during the first 12 years of follow-up was 29, which compares favourably with the 58 needed for tamoxifen at that time
 - previously observed reduction of other cancers with anastrozole, notably non-melanoma skin cancer, has continued with longer follow up

 results provide additional support for the use of anastrozole as the treatment of choice for breast cancer risk reduction in most postmenopausal women at high risk of developing breast cancer

NICE guidance states (2):

Chemoprevention for women with no personal history of breast cancer:

- should be discussed within a specialist genetic clinic
- healthcare professionals within a specialist genetic clinic should discuss and give written information on the absolute risks and benefits of all options for chemoprevention to women at high risk or moderate risk of breast cancer
- discussion and information should include the side effects of drugs, the extent of risk reduction, and the risks and benefits of alternative approaches, such risk-reducing surgery and surveillance

Guideline for the use of Antiemetics in Adults Receiving Anticancer Drug Therapy (v3.0, September 2023)

This guideline has been updated by the SACT Expert Advisory Group and is available on the <u>WMCA</u> <u>website</u>. It provides guidance to support the management of patients who experience, or are likely to experience, anticancer treatment related nausea and vomiting.

GIRFT and the NHS Cancer Programme:

GIRFT and the NHS Cancer Programme have collaborated on summary guidance to support clinicians to better meet the Faster Diagnosis Standard (FDS) for cancer. Best practice timed diagnostic cancer pathways include advice for all stages of a cancer diagnosis, as well as insights from the relevant GIRFT national clinical leads and links to best practice case studies. Elective Care Improvement Support Team: IST Cancer Pathway Training: Monday 13th November 2023 – 8th January 2024:

Invitation to join the online course on Elective Care Fundamentals – Cancer Pathway Management - Massive Open Online Course (MOOC). We are writing to invite you or members of your team to participate in our free online course helping to support staff improve the way they manage cancer pathways.

The Elective Care Improvement Support Team (IST), in close collaboration with the Improvement Capability Building & Delivery Team, have created a Massive Open Online Course (MOOC) dedicated to cancer pathway management. This free, self-paced, and facilitated MOOC is designed to support system-wide teams, organisations, and individuals in developing the essential skills required for managing cancer pathways. Created by experienced operational managers and practitioners with expertise in managing cancer care, this course equips participants with core skills to navigate cancer pathways effectively, facilitating the recovery of cancer services post-pandemic.

About the course:

The course comprises of four, one-hour content modules available 24/7 over an eight-week period to support staff to improve their knowledge of managing cancer patient waiting lists. The course delivers essential resources and tools through a practical, structured learning approach. Delegates can progress through the modules at their own pace within the learning platform while engaging with peers and experienced tutors from the Elective Care IST. This interaction maximises learning and empowers learners to promptly apply your newfound knowledge.

The course will be running from 13 November 2023 to 8 January 2024 with further cohorts planned in 2024.

Who will benefit from this course?

The Cancer Pathway Management MOOC is open to all NHS staff, including:

- 1. Operational managers in acute providers interested in cancer services.
- 2. ICS or regional managers seeking a deeper understanding of cancer operational management.
- 3. Cancer senior booking team members and supervisors.
- 4. Booking team and medical secretaries.
- 5. MDT coordinators and cancer pathway trackers.

While some modules may not apply to all job roles, this comprehensive course offers valuable development opportunities for those aiming to gain well-rounded knowledge of cancer pathway management.

By the course's end, participants will:

- 1. Have increased knowledge of cancer pathways.
- 2. Possess improved knowledge and confidence in Cancer Waiting Time (CWT) rules and their practical application.
- 3. Be able to identify best practices in cancer pathway management and areas for improvement.
- 4. Have improved understanding of the roles and responsibilities of all staff involved in the cancer pathway.
- 5. Be capable of describing the importance of reports and KPIs for monitoring and enhancing pathways.

Delegates will be able to access the full range of online materials once they have registered on the platform, enrolled on the course and the course has opened. The course materials and resources will remain available for eight weeks until the course closes.

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Enrolling on the course

To participate in the course, delegates will need to be registered with their official NHS email on our <u>QI Learning Platform</u> and enrol on the course. In readiness, they will need to follow these registration instructions as soon as possible:

- 1. If they have already registered on the **QI Learning Platform**, then they simply need to **enrol**.
- 2. If they have not already registered on the platform, they need to do so by visiting the <u>QI Learning</u> <u>Platform page</u> and then simply <u>enrol.</u>
